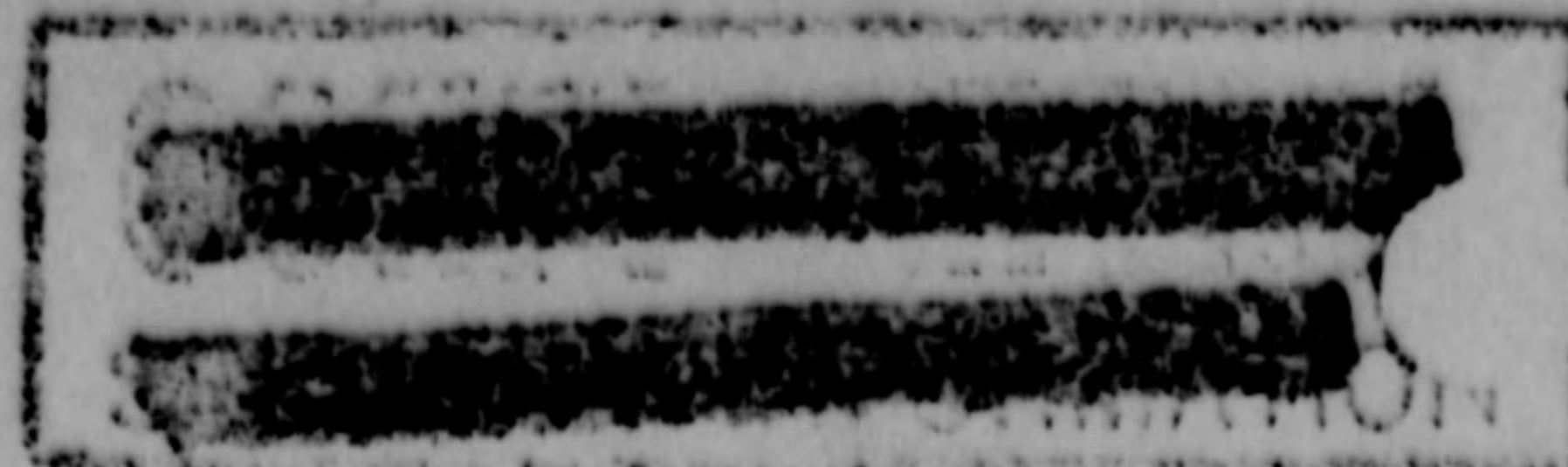

1. SYNOPSIS: Disc-like objects observed flying southwest of Chicago, approximately 0648 hours, 22 July 1952, at such high speed altitude, speed, and confirmation could not be accurately described.

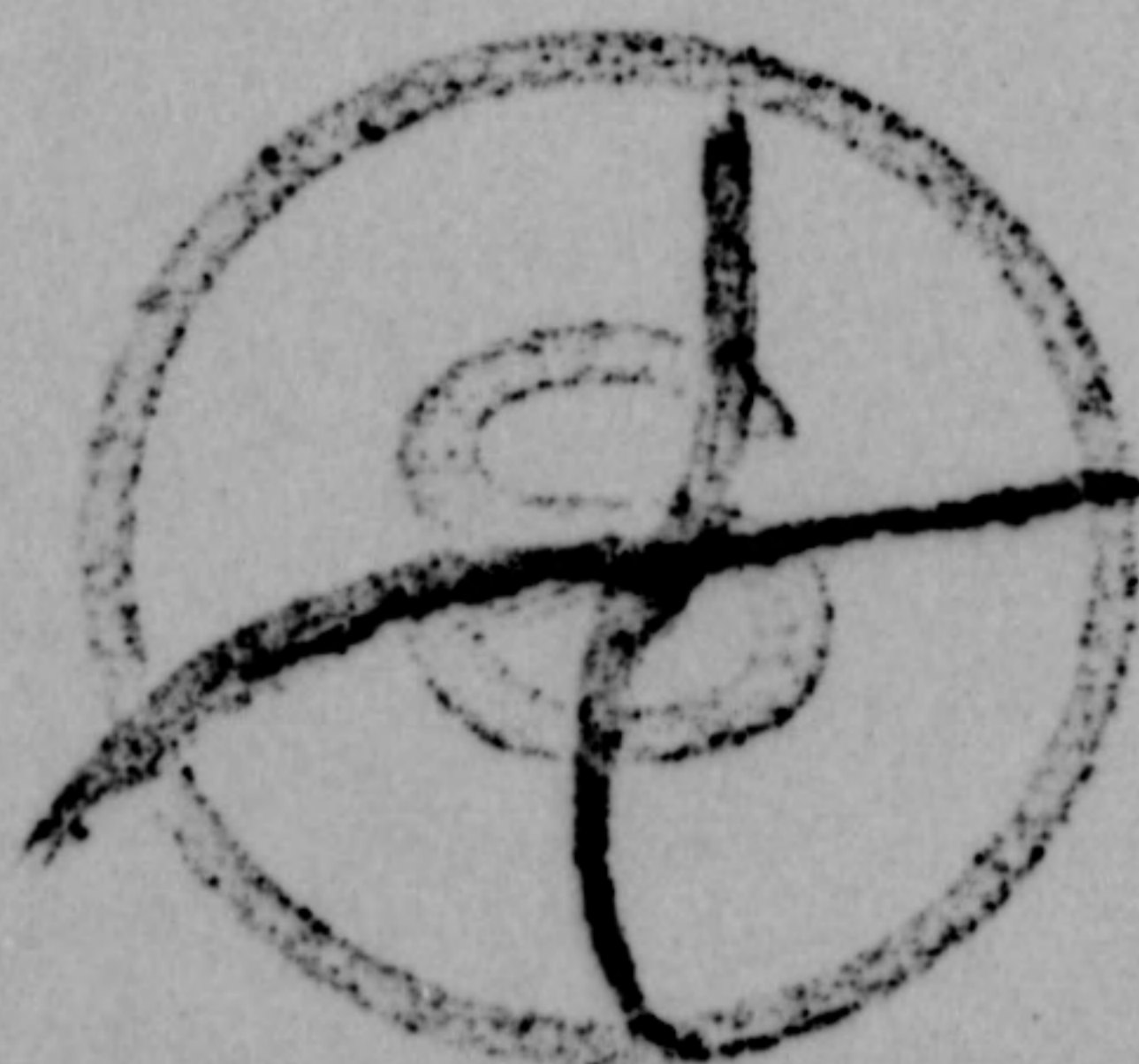
2. DETAILS: [REDACTED], Chicago Tribune, telephonically advised this office that he had been informed by Mr. [REDACTED] employed in the Baking Department, National Biscuit Company, Chicago, that at 0648 hours, 22 July, while driving on Humboldt Boulevard, Chicago, he observed two (2) disc-like objects flying southwest towards Lake Michigan. However, the objects disappeared so rapidly he was unable to make any estimate of altitude, speed, or confirmation.

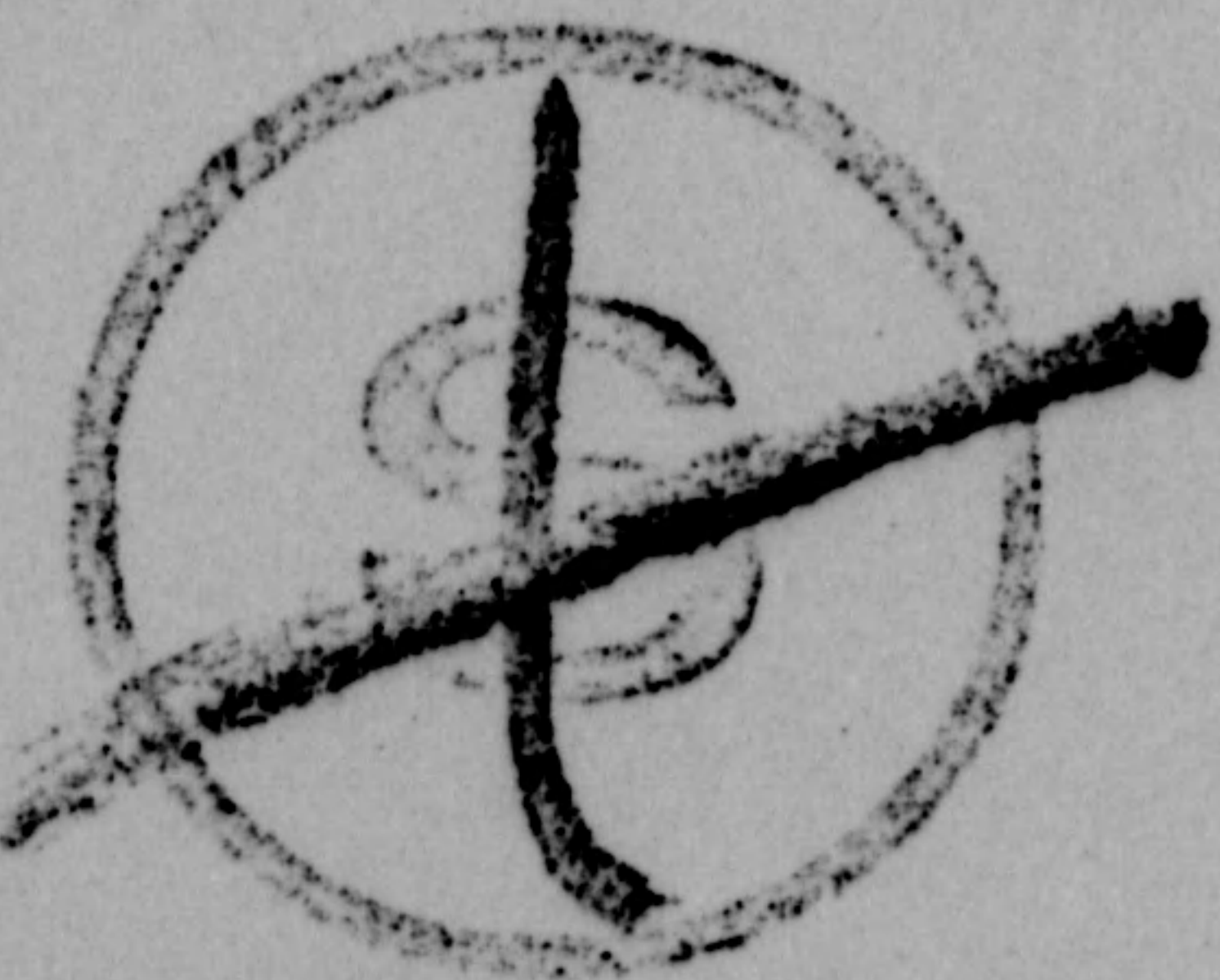
1. SYNOPSIS: Five (5) or seven (7) luminous spots flying in sky about 2115 hours, 24 July 1952, approximately forty (40) miles north of Chicago.

2. DETAILS: [REDACTED], Attorney, [REDACTED] Boulevard, Chicago, telephonically advised this office that about 2115 hours, 24 July 1952, while attending a Ravinia Concert (out-door concerts held approximately forty (40) miles north of Chicago on Lake Michigan), he saw five (5) or seven (7) luminous spots in the sky flying in an irregular, horizontal line. The "spots" appeared to be traveling from south to north at the zenith. Mr. Bessler heard no noise and could make no guess as to the altitude except that they were very high. He estimated the speed from about 1500 to 2000 miles per hour.

3. ACTION: Two (2) copies of instant report being forwarded direct to the Commanding General, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.

1. Four distinctly grey, round objects in formation (elements of two, stepped up) observed at fast rate, constant rate of speed. There was no sound and no visible trail or exhaust. The size was similar to a silver dollar at arms length.

2. The sighting was at 2230 CEST, 22 July 1952. The duration of the sighting was 2 minutes.

3. The observation was visual from the surface.

4. The observer was located at 8032 S. Winchester Chicago, Illinois. The object was due south of observer at an elevation of 60° to 70°. The object was traveling from E to W.

5. The observer was Mr. Larry Seborg, who was a former TSgt in the 12th A.F. He claims to be completely familiar with air craft. His wife also observed these objects.

6. The weather was clear, visibility 15 miles and a slight temperature inversion at 45,000 feet. Winds aloft:

1. At 2130 hours 18 July 1952 one object approximately size of fighter aircraft was sighted at approximate altitude of 5000 feet over the south edge of the City of Manchester, New Hampshire. Object was reported by Major Fisher who at the time was flying F-47 type aircraft altitude of which was 2000 feet three miles east of Grenier Air Force Base. Report was made by 1st Lt. Feustel, Mobile Control Officer at Grenier Air Force Base and S/Sgt Schehl, Senior Operator of Grenier Air Force Base Tower.

2. Object was traveling from west to east at extreme high rate of speed.

3. Object appeared to be in slight glide and was visible from 5 to 7 seconds.

4. Object was ball shape with short tail which broke off and burned out in two to three seconds. Immediately thereafter the rest of the object appeared to burn out.

5. Main part was very bright and blue white in color. The tail appeared pink and blue with shades of yellow throughout entire object.

6. Weather at time 10,000 scattered, 20,000 thin broken, Visibility 20 miles, winds aloft 270 to 310 degrees at 18 to 20 knots.

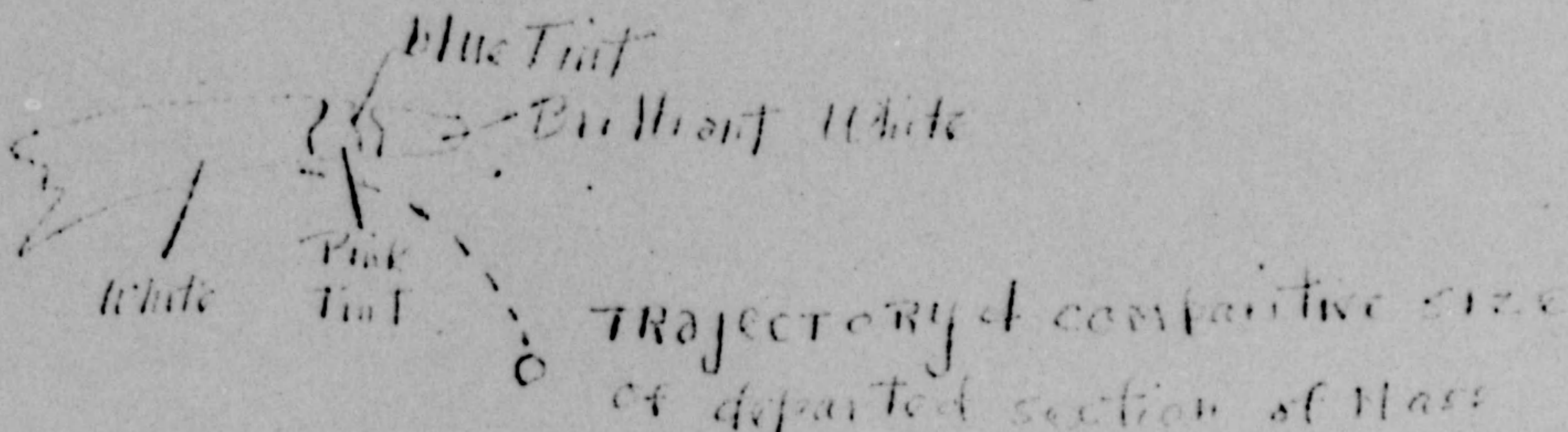

STATEMENT

As per verbal request of Major Cook the following report is submitted:

At approximately 2130 hours, 18 July 1952, I was flying at angels two, three miles east of Greiner Air Force Base, Manchester, New Hampshire, on a heading of 350 degrees, when I noted a bright object appearing from the west. This object appeared to be at four to five thousand feet on a east south-easterly course, and in a ten to fifteen degree angle of descent. The head of this mass was brilliant white followed by a slight pink, then blue tinge. A short white trail was behind this mass. After three to four seconds a bright object departed from the main mass and trajected sharply downward, disappearing in approximately one second or less. The main mass continued on its course for another one to two seconds, then suddenly faded from sight. Assuming that this mass was in the immediate vicinity of Manchester, I would estimate its speed at two thousand miles per hour. If this mass were at a greater distance the speed would be substantially increased.

SUBJECT: Flying Saucers

TO: Operations & Training Officer  
Grenier Air Force Base  
Manchester, New Hampshire

1. At approximately 2130 hours, 18 July 1952, the undersigned was working at the "A" position stand controlling two aircraft who were shooting landings. The aircraft were two F-47's, Raymond 35 (A/c #951) and aircraft #107.

2. The mobile control unit was in position for runway #17 and was being handled by Lt Fuestel. At approximately 2030 hrs a/c #107 was on approach north of the field for runway #17 and was being watched by the tower. At this time an object appeared in the sky moving at a fast rate from the west towards the east.

3. The object was at about 800 or 900 feet when it first appeared and descended before it faded from view over Manchester. The object seemed to be a brilliant yellow and was about 200 feet in diameter. Estimated speed of the object was in excess of 1000 miles per hour.

4. The object was in sight for about four seconds so these estimates are purely rough estimates. The runway control officer asked aircraft #107 if he had seen the object and the pilot replied that he had.

5. The tower personnel thought no more of it until Concord radio was overheard advising Boston Control that this object had been sighted by some civilians in Concord, N.H. Boston wanted all the information available, so Grenier tower told them it had been sighted from here by the tower personnel, two pilots, and the runway control officer. Boston requested a full report on the incident and later tower had a call from Headquarters G.C.I. Security who also wanted a report.

6. I contacted 133rd Fighter Ops and asked that the pilot of aircraft #107 give tower a report on what he had seen. The pilot, Major Fisher said the object was spotted north of the field heading from west to east on a downhill course. It was blue, yellow and pink in color and seemed to have a tail like a comet. The object

broke in two over Manchester. The first part burning out rapidly followed by the main body. This report was verified by Lt Tillery, one of the pilots (A/e Raymond 35) who said he saw the same thing.

7. This entire report was written into the Master Log for 18 July 1952 and was submitted to the Operations Dispatcher at 2305 hours.

8. The above is a true report, to the best of my knowledge.

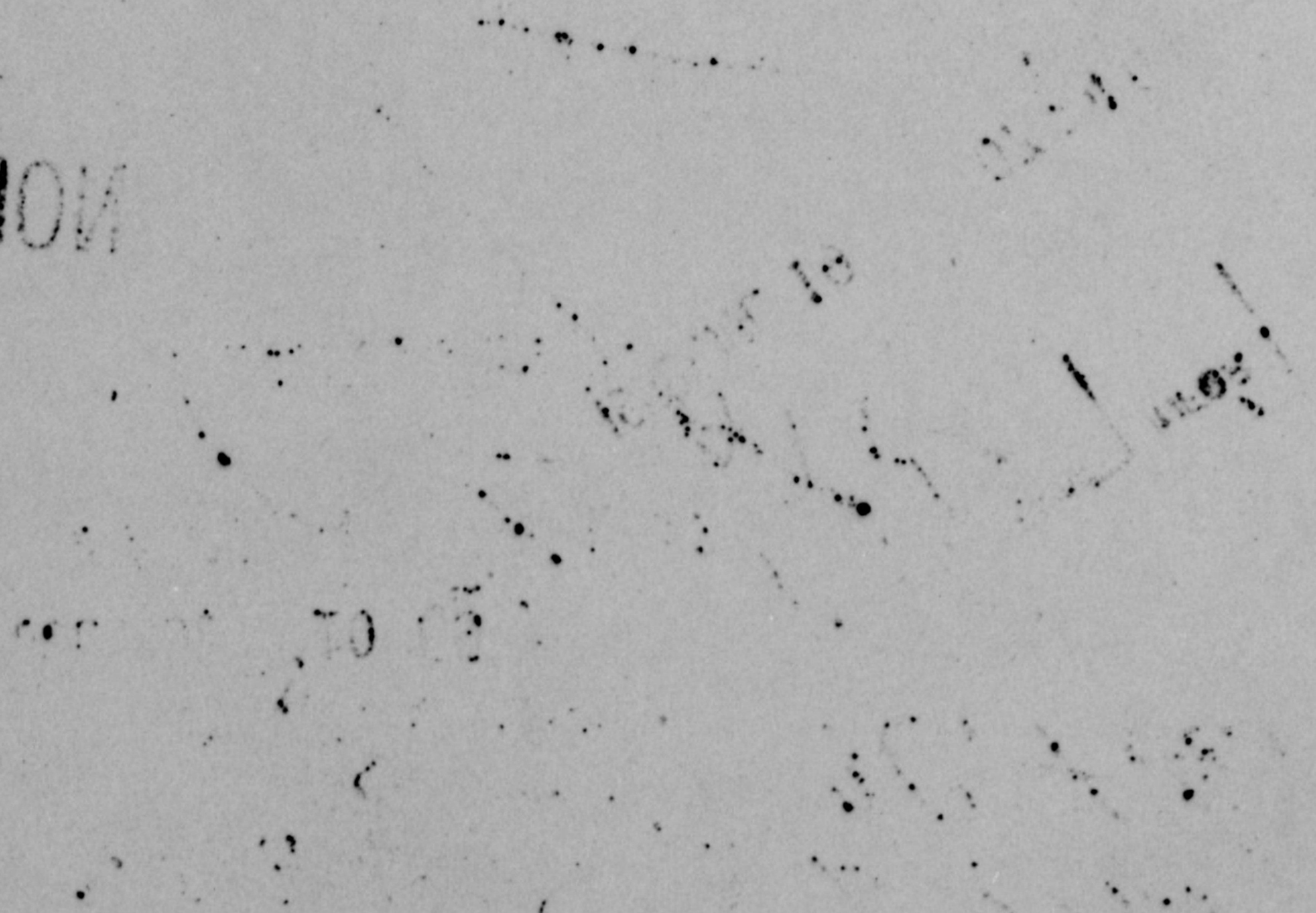
