Ice Falls From Sky

TOCCOA, Ga.—A Georgia farmer said today he was almost clobbered by a strange, 40-pound chunk of ice that whooshed out of a clear sky and hit in his garden.

"I was no more than 12 feet away when it hit, and it almost scared me to death," the farmer, Claude J. Liberty, said.

Pieces of it shattered as it crunched into the ground and dug through a foot of topsoil.

Chemists who analyzed the muddy-colored water said it was pure, soft and untreated, non-chlorinated water such as rain. It was not manufactured ice, they said. The muddy color was attributed to particles of red clay picked up when it dug a crater through the garden soil.

Reports from the village of Acasia, Italy, said a 40-pound chunk of ice fell mysteriously from the sky there on Monday.

SUBJECT: Pieces of Ice Falling From Out of Sky

1. On 30 December 1959, AFCIN-4F3c informed 4F3d that information had been received to the effect that large pieces of ice of unexplained origin had fallen to Earth in Georgia. Clippings from a newspaper were submitted in which mention was made of analysis work being performed on the ice by the Army Ice Snow and Permafrost Research Laboratory in Wilmette, Illinois. AFCIN-4F3d was requested to obtain further information on the subject.
2. A long distance call was placed to the Army Laboratory mentioned above and it was established that the analysis of the ice was being performed nearby, at Evanston, Illinois.
3. It was possible to talk to Dr. [REDACTED] at the Evanston facility, telephone number [REDACTED]. 24. He indicated that they had only received a small piece of ice, measuring about 1 by 2". The analysis indicated that it was artificial ice rather dirty, in other words not of natural origin. The characteristic crystals of hail was completely absent. Dr. [REDACTED] gave as an example of origin as detaching itself from an airplane. He further [REDACTED] mentioned that a similar event had taken place about two years ago in New Jersey, in that at that time the Physical Sciences Division of the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia, Pa. had performed the ice analysis. Finally, he indicated that an analysis of the water resulting from the melting of ice is being performed by some agency unknown to him.
4. Dr. [REDACTED] promised to send 4F3d a copy of his report on the present incident and will attach the name of the organization performing the water analysis and any further information available to him on the subject. He expected a delay of about two weeks before being able to send the report.

Bureau of Standards official report due soon - Off the record Dr. [REDACTED] said that sample appeared to be coastal water, probably object fell from aircraft known to be in area at the time.

The [REDACTED], Reading, Pa., have analyzed six similar cases and in each case determined the ice to be from aircraft.

Ice ranged in weight from 25 to 100 lbs.

Dr [REDACTED] pointed out that the press has hounded the Smithsonian for information concerning the ice and indicated that they felt something was being withheld.

REP. JAMES DAVIS (D-GA.) RELEASED A REPORT FROM THREE GOVERNMENT AGENCIES YESTERDAY ANNOUNCING THAT THE ICE WAS FORMED WHEN DRINKING WATER LEAKED FROM A COMMERCIAL DC-8 JET PLANE FLYING AT 39,000 FEET, THE WATER FROZE OUTSIDE THE PLANE AND THEN DROPPED WHEN THE PLANE DESCENDED.

THE REPORT BY THE U. S. GEOLOGICAL SURVEY, THE NATIONAL BUREAU OF STANDARDS AND THE U. S. WEATHER BUREAU INCLUDED 40 PAGES OF FINDINGS IN ADDITION TO DIAGRAMS AND PICTURES.
