This report is a little late but I hope you will be interested enough to help us out.



This is to acknowledge your letter of 26 January 1959 concerning news story on an unidentified flying object seen over La Crosse, Wisconsin, on 18 January 1959.

A thorough search of our records indicates this particular sighting was not reported to the Air Force.

A check with Air Force radar and weather stations in the area failed to disclose any vehicle or balloon in the area at the time which would cause the effects described in the news article.

The fact that Civil Aeronautics Administration personnel and local airport officials saw nothing unusual is also considered significant.

Fiery, Fast-Flying Object Seen In Sky

West Salem and La Crosse residents early Sunday reported seeing a fiery object in the sky traveling at a very high rate of speed.

But officials at the Civil Aeronautics Administration and United States Weather Bureau facilities at La Crosse Municipal Airport could shed no light on what it was. The officials personally had not witnessed anything new in the sky at that hour.

At West Salem, it was reported, several persons in various places saw a bright flash of light about 6 a.m., traveling from east to west.

Ross Fuller was driving on Highway 16 and said the light shone brightly into his car. Joe Larson, a resident at a hotel downtown, witnessed it as did a Mr. Hendrickson of Northern state Power Co.

Oscar Storandt said he was at home when he noticed a bright light flash through the window about the same hour but he attributed it possibly to a passing car.

Finn A. Johnson, a meteorological technician at the USWB, reported to his administrator, that

several persons called at about 6 a.m. to report the incident. Milo Novotny, CAA official, said the office had no record of unusual sky happenings and that a log on aircraft showed no mention of "foreign" objects at that hour.

The sun, according to weather bureau records, did not rise in this area Sunday until 7:35 a.m., discounting that as a factor in the report.
